Biography for M. Andersen “Andy” Rapp
Submitted on May 19, 2026

Inspired by his father, Dr. Marvin Rapp, a former community college president who established 30 community colleges and over a half dozen educational television stations in the state of New York, it seemed only natural that Andy Rapp would find his way to Delta Community College. He came to work at its public television station after receiving his master’s degree in educational broadcasting from State University of New York. He also received a bachelor’s degree in liberal arts from Colgate University.



M. Andersen “Andy” Rapp worked full-time at Delta College for 18 years (1969 to 1987), where he taught broadcast history and law, and on-air performance classes as a Delta College associate professor of broadcasting. As part of his involvement with students, he also helped establish Delta College’s chapter of Alpha Epsilon Rho, which is the international scholastic honor society recognizing academic achievement among students in the field of broadcasting and electronic media. Established in 1974, it was the first two-year college in the country to be accepted into the national society, thereby setting precedent for other community colleges.

He also served as a producer-director, and eventually as an executive producer, and on-air TV program host on WUCM-TV. His dedication to building a local community presence on our airwaves spanned 36 years and included the following unique local programs:

- ***Junta de Amigos*** (1969 to 1970) – the first prime time bilingual (Spanish/English) series in the nation.
- ***Face to Face*** (January to Sept. 1971) A sociological/psychological study of society's social fringe.
- ***Day By Day*** (Oct. 1971 to Jan. 1985) The only live weekday series of its kind in a market Delta's size or larger.
- ***Ways People Play*** (1974-1975) A series focusing on all local sports that were not baseball, football, basketball or hockey.
- ***Trivia All Stars*** (Feb. 1985 to April 1986) A game show that followed the trivia trend at the time.
- ***The Weekly*** (1985 to 1988) The one-hour panel discussion series focused on a single topic, featuring a live studio audience and call-in participation.
- ***Currently Speaking*** (1999 to 2016) A weekly, live one-hour program totally about opinion, the host's opinion, the rotating guests' opinion, and most importantly, the viewers' opinion.

In 1987, Andy left Delta College Public Media and formed the consulting firm, The Rapp Group, to advise businesses and political candidates regarding media and broadcasting relations. He joined Northwood University as an associate professor, where he taught speech as well as created and coached an award-winning forensic team for a number of years before retiring from there in 2015.



Andy returned to Delta College Public TV to host *Currently Speaking* for another 18 years (from 1999 to 2016). Totalling 36 years in length, Mr. Rapp's career on our airwaves holds the record as the longest span of any of our hosts and producers.

During his broadcasting career he received several awards, including the prestigious School Bell Award from the Michigan Education Association. It honored the station and Mr. Rapp in 1971 for presenting live telecasts of the contract negotiations between the

Saginaw Township School Board and the township's teachers association. It was a precedent setting production and acquainted viewers with the bargaining process.

WUCM TV-19 established a Broadcast Explorer Post 2719 (Boy Scouts of America) at Delta College in 1971, which was coordinated by Andy Rapp. The group met twice monthly and studied mass communication topics. The Explorer Post was the first of its type in the nation and brought recognition for Andy when he was given the Bronze Big Horn Award by the Boy Scouts of America in 1982.

Andy participated and led many organizations including as a member of the board of the United Way of Michigan, president of the Saginaw Valley Press Club, president of the Humane Society of Saginaw County, and president of The Arc, for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Throughout 1985, Andy also wrote a weekly column on the media entitled "Media Monitor", which was syndicated by Hearst Newspapers. In 1987, Andy left Delta College to form the consulting firm, The Rapp Group, to advise businesses and political candidates regarding media and broadcasting.

In 1991, he served as president of the Midland Noon Rotary Club and subsequently became Rotary 6310 District Governor. Currently, he is an active member of Torch International, a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason, Royal Arch Mason, Sovereign Master AMD, Knights Templar and Rosicrucian Frere.

Delta College launched Channel 19 on October 12, 1964, with the call letters of WUCM. On December 1, 1989, the College added its public radio station, WUCX FM-90.1, which is jointly operated by Delta College and Central Michigan University. In October 1997, Delta College changed the call letters of its PBS station to WDCQ. The stations continue to enhance the College's commitment to quality and educational services as it delivers quality NPR and PBS programming to the Great Lakes Bay Region, Flint and the Thumb.

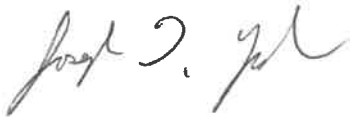

Dear Award Committee:

I have the pleasure of providing this letter of support for the nomination of M. Andersen "Andy" Rapp for a Public Media Impact Award in 2026. I work in the Delta College Foundation, raising private sector dollars for the institution and I wholeheartedly endorse this effort. I encourage you to recognize Mr. Rapp and his financial support of our public broadcasting stations – WDCQ-TV and WUCX-FM.

Andy was a faculty member at Delta College for nearly two decades and also served as an executive producer and host of numerous locally produced programs. His belief in our public broadcasting mission is strong, and he has maintained a partnership with our operation for many more decades.

When the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) had its funding rescinded by Congress in the summer of 2025, Andy contacted me to ask how he and his wife could help the operation financially. That discussion quickly led to the Rapps' commitment to a substantial six figure contribution, which was welcome and positive news to the staff and the college.

With a strong belief in the value of public TV and public radio at Delta College, Andy Rapp and his wife Donna established the Delta College Public Media Quasi-Endowment. The intent is for the funds to be used to support local programming on both WDCQ-TV and WUCX-FM 90.1. The money may also be spent on the survival of Delta College's public radio and television, if needed, in order to cover the local, statewide or national costs of programming or operations.

Delta College is one of only a handful of community colleges (2 years) in the country to operate a public TV and radio station. Public Media is part of the College's community service mission, and the stations are a foundational part of local towns and cities in the Great Lakes Bay Region.

With the Rapps' financial commitment, our Public Media stations can continue to impact our region for decades to come by offering a tremendous level of community programming and service.

I understand the two categories for consideration would be as a Professional or as a Donor – and Mr. Rapp excels in both areas. I would be more than happy to respond to any further questions you have.

Commitment from the Rapps



One of the key responsibilities of a public broadcasting station—both TV and radio—is to be responsive and available to the community it serves. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) calls it a "right of access," or public use of the airwaves.

Andy and Donna Rapp established a fund to provide long-term financial support for Delta College Public Media, due to their strong belief in the value of public TV and public radio. Creation of this fund allows the dollars to be invested and for the principal to grow over time; however, it can also support current programming or equipment costs, if needed.

A history of Public Media



Delta College launched Channel 19 on October 12, 1964, with the call letters of WUCM. On December 1, 1989, the college added its public radio station, WUCX FM-90.1, which is jointly operated by Delta College and Central Michigan University. In October 1997, Delta College changed the call letters of its PBS station to WDCQ. The stations continue to enhance the college's commitment to quality programming and educational services as it delivers NPR and PBS shows to the Great Lakes Bay Region, Flint and the Thumb.

Since 1964, Delta College's Public Broadcast stations have thrived because we focus on bringing great programming to the viewers and listeners of the Great Lakes Bay Region. Our logo and "look" has changed over the years, as reflected by the change in logos shown below, but having a focus on local programming has always endured.

A Commitment to Local Programming

For nearly 62 years, Delta College's Public TV station has created, produced and aired a cadre of local programs. As long-time supporters, we are sure you may remember many of them from the past decades. We thought it would be fun to revisit some of our favorites. The timing is opportune, as we gather to dedicate our TV studio to the Rapp Family, due to their ongoing commitment to the station.

M. Andersen "Andy" Rapp worked full-time at Delta College, where he taught classes as a Delta College associate professor of broadcasting. He served as a producer-director, executive producer, and on-air TV program host on WUCM TV-19. **Totalling 36 years in length, Mr. Rapp's career on our airwaves holds the record as the longest span of any of our talented and dedicated host/producers.**

Andy taught broadcast history and law, and on-air performance classes. He also helped establish Delta College's chapter of Alpha Epsilon Rho, which is the international scholastic honor society recognizing academic achievement among students in the field of broadcasting and electronic media. Established in 1974, it was the first two-year college in the country to be accepted into the national society, thereby setting precedent for other community colleges.

Andy served as a producer-director, and eventually as an executive producer, and on-air TV program host for several series between 1970 and 2016, which stood apart for their originality. His dedication was to building a local community presence on our airwaves and included many local programs.



Junta de Amigos (1969 to 1970)
The first bi-lingual (Spanish/English) television series in the nation. The series provided a platform for Mexican American members of the community to engage in meaningful conversations about historical, political and cultural issues that mattered to them. The program also showcased segments dedicated to cooking, art and music, offering viewers a rich

and diverse glimpse into the community's traditions and creative expressions. Notably, the set itself was thoughtfully crafted by David Torrez, a well-known local Mexican American artist, adding an authentic visual element that connected the program's content to its cultural roots.



Face to Face (January to Sept. 1971) A sociological/psychological study of society's social fringe. With support from two Delta College faculty members, twelve individuals who were considered outside the mainstream were selected for one-on-one half hour interviews. Each interview was structured into background and context followed by questions developed by both a sociologist and a psychologist. This approach enabled a meaningful comparison highlighting commonalities and unique differences between participants. The *Face to Face* series was utilized in classrooms to illustrate case studies, serving as a valuable academic resource for nearly two decades. Interestingly, many individuals who were once considered part of society's fringe would likely not be categorized that way today, reflecting how societal perceptions evolve over time.

Day By Day (Oct. 1971 to Jan. 1985) The only live weekday series of its kind in a market Delta's size or larger. For nearly fourteen years, the half hour program broadcast live every weekday, in the morning and evening. At its zenith, *Day By Day* boasted a team of thirty-two volunteer producers, whose dedication contributed to the show's remarkable output. Over its impressive run, the program aired an astounding 3,300 individual episodes, offering fresh perspectives and fostering community engagement. The show addressed a broad spectrum of topics, from local events and community activities to compelling personalities from all walks of life. Some of the 30-minute shows covered a single topic, others with multiple topics. One of the program's standout features was its commitment to interviewing every celebrity who visited the region as a single guest for 30 minutes. Distinguished guests included Vincent Price, Ralph Nader, Charlton Heston, Susanne Pleshette, Jesse Owens, Lowell Thomas, Noel Neal (Lois Lane on TV Superman), Pierre Salinger, Susan Brown Miller, Mary Traverse (of Peter, Paul, and Mary), Larry Flynt, Jack Anderson, Anson Williams, Fred W. Friendly (CBS News), Garrick Utley (NBC News), Daniel Schorr (CBS News) and Jim McKay (ABC Sports) and Hugh Downs, among many others. These conversations were unique and thoughtful, based on research of intriguing aspects of each guest's life. The focus of the interviews shifted away from sensationalism, and resulted in discussions that offered insightful, memorable and engaging looks at well-known personalities. This legacy of consistent, meaningful coverage firmly established *Day By Day* as a vital platform for dialogue and connection within Delta's broadcast area.





***Ways People Play* (1974-1975)** A series focusing on all local sports that were not baseball, football, basketball or hockey. During a period when many lesser-known sports—such as motor sports and women’s athletics—were largely overlooked, this sports program sought to shine a spotlight on these often-neglected areas. Notably, the series adhered to its focus on secondary sports, with only one notable exception: a special half-hour interview featuring USC and Buffalo Bills running back O.J. Simpson. This episode stood out as a unique departure from the program’s usual emphasis, underscoring the significance of Simpson’s career at the time.

***The Weekly* (1985 to 1988)** The one-hour panel discussion series focused on a single topic, featuring a live studio audience and call-in participation. The inaugural episode exemplified the program’s approach by spotlighting female activists from the local community, each unique in their background yet united in purpose. Notably, Sister Ardeth Platte, a Catholic nun renowned for leading protests against military installations in northern Michigan, and Mary Sinclair, a determined housewife who famously played a pivotal role in shutting down the Midland nuclear power plant, were among the guests. The show continued to feature other compelling guests who shared a similar drive for social change. After Andy Rapp departed the series, Barb Handley Miller, a former commercial TV news director and later a Delta faculty member, assumed both producing and hosting responsibilities.



Currently Speaking (1999 to 2016) A weekly, live one-hour program totally about opinion, the host's opinion, the rotating guests' opinion, and most importantly, the viewers' opinion. Spanning nearly two decades, *Currently Speaking* became a vital platform for community dialogue within Delta's coverage area. The show emerged at a time when many individuals felt their opinions were overlooked, offering them a rare and valuable chance to voice their perspectives publicly. The open forum featured lively debate as the host and rotating guests challenged participants, fostering honest and thought-provoking exchanges. The program tackled sensitive and divisive subjects, often venturing into territory other broadcasts avoided. This commitment to transparency and dialogue sometimes brought backlash, including hate mail, online harassment, and even the occasional threat. Yet, the team behind *Currently Speaking* understood the necessity of such a forum. They embraced what could be called the "tea kettle philosophy": just as a kettle needs to let off steam, so too does a community need a safe space for honest expression, especially during turbulent times. The series gave people a voice and encouraged open, sometimes challenging, conversations.



Great TV Auction (1972 to 1988) WUCM TV-19 held the first of its Great TV Auctions to raise money for new equipment and technology. Dubbed the "Rainbow Auction," the televised auction raised nearly \$40,000 (\$230,000 in today's money), which helped the station broadcast in color starting in 1974. The last Great TV Auction was in 1988, and the proceeds helped the station become the first in mid-Michigan to broadcast in stereo.

Local Programming on Public Radio

We have highlighted the long history of local programs on WDCQ-TV, which was earlier called WUCM TV-19. But, Delta College Public Media also has a wide variety of local programs that air on its public radio station, WUCX FM-90.1.

- ***The Audition Room*** – Rod Bieber hosts a collection of new releases in a variety of musical styles, giving the upper hand to local artists and sprinkling in some musical commentary, a bit of musical history and trivia.
- ***Backstage Explorer*** – Rod Bieber hosts this interview and music program that highlights local and regional arts and humanities groups and featuring performing arts as well as a variety of cultural groups in the region.
- ***Beyond Broadway*** – Delta's Joe Yezak and theatre veteran Emily Anderson play some of the best musical numbers from the past 50 years and offer exclusive interviews with members of our own local theatre community.
- ***La Caliente 90.1*** – Mike Mendoza hosts the show which consists mostly of Tejano music which originated out of San Antonio, Texas, but he also features other types of Latino music in the mix.
- ***El Sol Latino*** – Long-time host Amy Guzman brings an hour of Latin pop and dance music to the audience every Saturday afternoon.



Some of the short segments that can be heard daily in the Morning Edition program from NPR include these locally created, 10-minute features:

- ***Backyard Astronomer*** – Mike Murray from the Delta College Planetarium takes a look at the night sky to highlight things that don't require a telescope to see.
- ***Lifelines with John Augustine*** – In what sounds like a national segment, John reviews biographies and recounts the lives of the people featured in them.
- ***Historia*** – Delta faculty members share interesting events and fascinating people, which aren't traditionally amplified in history textbooks.
- ***Mental Health Minute*** – Dr. Dave Baskind discusses psychology research and then explains how psychology impacts your life.
- ***Environment Report*** – "Mr. Great Lakes," Jeff Kart, hosts this weekly update on environmental issues in Michigan and the Great Lakes.

Rapp Family Profile

Donna Rapp served as senior vice president and corporate secretary of MyMichigan Health, and president of the MyMichigan Health Foundation, retiring in 2018. She received many state and national awards for her work in marketing. In 1995, she was elected president of the Midland Morning Rotary Club and was one of the first eight women in the world to serve as District Governor of Rotary International.

Donna volunteers as a docent at the Alden B. Dow Home and Studio and has served many organizations including the Midland Center for the Arts, MATRIX: MIDLAND Festival, Midland Area Community Foundation, Midland Country Club and the American Lung Association of Michigan. She has received many awards and honors, including the Athena Award from the Midland Area Chamber of Commerce, as well as the Woman of Distinction from the Mitten Bay Girl Scout Council.

Donna attended Delta College and transferred to the University of Michigan to receive her bachelor's degree, double majoring in communications and French. Her master's degree in journalism was earned at Central Michigan University. She later returned to Delta College to complete an associate's degree.

Andy and Donna live in Midland and are parents of daughter Megan. She and her husband Ben both work for Kohler Company. On September 9, 2025, the Rapps welcomed granddaughter, Merritt Andersen Rapp, to the family.

Our Funding Picture

Delta College's Public Media stations have been a broadcasting staple in our region for decades. As the college celebrates its 65th Anniversary this year, it is proud to continue this valuable service, with the community's commitment and support.

We suffered a loss in federal funding last year, but the community has stepped up to help us meet our financial goals. Our viewers and listeners know the great value of our public media service. Here in our region, and far beyond, Delta College Public Media is an indispensable and unmatched source of news, information, cultural commentary and insights into an incredibly broad range of issues and events – whether they happen down the block or across the world.

Recently, a federal judge ruled against the 2025 Executive Order implemented by President Trump, which declared no funding could be given to PBS or NPR stations. Although this is very good news, the ruling didn't address the Congressional rescission vote that occurred last July, so all federal funding grant cuts that have been made, still remain in place.

The stations produce and air local programs focused on our community, as well as popular long-form documentaries. They are enjoyed by the viewers and listeners of the Great Lakes Bay Region, as well as the Thumb and Flint, who have been supportive of our efforts for decades. With support like that received from the Rapps, Delta College Public Media will continue to produce and air quality local programs, in line with our educational mission.
